Parklands Highlights

From horse riding to enjoying a good read under a tree, Centennial Parklands offers the best of both worlds – a place to play, recreate or relax.

Centennial Parklands includes Centennial Park, Moore Park and Queens Park, and encompasses around 360 hectares. The three parks are listed on the State Heritage Register of NSW and various areas within the Parklands are of national, state or local heritage significance.

Centennial Park is located on land that was an important meeting place of Indigenous Australians of the area – the Gadigal clan of the Eora nation. Today, it remains a meeting place for the community to enjoy featuring:

- Formal Gardens, ponds and heritage features
- Native Wildlife
- Sporting Fields
- Stunning sites for weddings and filming and photography
- Picnic sites for friends and family gatherings

Queens Park:

- Sporting fields
- Two fitness stations
- Panoramic views of the Sydney skyline

Moore Park:

- An 18-hole public golf course and driving range
- An Equestrian Centre and Sports Centre
- An entertainment precinct including Fox Studios, Hoyts Cinemas, Royal Hall of Industries and the Hordern Pavilion
- ES Marks Athletics Fields



Recreation activities

Centennial Park's Grand Drive Loop is used by walkers, joggers, roller-bladders and cyclists alike. The 3.7 km loop is about a 40 minute walk.

BBQs AND PICNICS (H2 N7 P8 H10 F11 K14 N14 O17)

Unlimited picnic spots with views of ponds, fields and gardens. Free BBQs. First-in first served basis. BYO portable BBQs with legs permitted (except during total fire bans), portable picnic equipment permitted.

CYCLE HIRE (N8)

Centennial Park Cycles is located at Fearnley Grounds. It provides bicycle hire, sales and repairs. Try one of their pedal cars for some extra fun!

A safe, dedicated cycling circuit for children, the Learners Cycleway, is also located at Fearnley Grounds (N7). Helmets required.

PLAYGROUNDS (E2 O6 G10 J10 P16)

Plants and Animals

Centennial Parklands displays a wide variety of native trees including Norfolk Island Pines, Port Jackson Figs, Holm Oaks, Paperbarks and protected areas of Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub, an endangered ecological community.

A visit to Centennial Park will also reveal a number of beautiful formal plantings in its Rose Garden, Column Garden and in Frog Hollow. These gardens are tended by a team of horticulturists to provide a year round display of native and exotic plants.

The flora of the Parklands doubles as a home to many native animal species including possums, birds, turtles and Sydney's largest bat colony.

Up to 124 native and 18 introduced species of land and water birds have been recorded in Centennial Parklands. Amongst the most popular species for local bird watchers are the Black Swans which breed in spring and the Black Cockatoos that visit in autumn. The endangered Powerful Owls or the Tawny Frogmouth are amongst the hardest to spot. Lorikeets, White Cockatoos and kookaburras can be seen in the Parklands all year round.

Birthplace of the nation

Did you know that Australia became a nation right here in Centennial Park?

On 1 January 1901, more than 60,000 people gathered in Centennial Park to witness the inauguration of the Australian Federation and swearing in of the very first Australian Prime Minister.
